

The Gospel of John

An Outline Emphasizing Love for God

The Gospel of John stands uniquely among the four Gospels, presenting Jesus not merely as a teacher or prophet, but as the eternal **Word of God made flesh** who came to reveal the Father's love to humanity. This profound theological work emphasizes the divine nature of Christ while calling believers to demonstrate their love for God through faith, obedience, and sacrificial love for one another. Structural Outline of John's Gospel

The Seven "I AM" Statements: These profound declarations reveal different aspects of Jesus' divine nature and His provision for human spiritual needs[8][9][10]:

1. **"I am the bread of life"** (6:35) - Jesus provides spiritual nourishment
2. **"I am the light of the world"** (8:12) - Jesus brings truth and guidance
3. **"I am the door/gate"** (10:7,9) - Jesus is the entry to salvation
4. **"I am the good shepherd"** (10:11,14) - Jesus provides loving care and protection
5. **"I am the resurrection and the life"** (11:25) - Jesus has power over death
6. **"I am the way, the truth, and the life"** (14:6) - Jesus is the exclusive path to God
7. **"I am the true vine"** (15:1) - Believers must remain connected to Jesus

III. Book of Glory: Love's Ultimate Expression (John 13:1-20:31)

This section focuses on Jesus' final week, containing His most intimate teachings about love and His ultimate demonstration of love through the cross[11][12][13].

Washing the Disciples' Feet (13:1-17): Jesus models humble service, showing that love for God is expressed through serving others, regardless of status or position.

The New Commandment (13:34-35): "Love one another as I have loved you. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another"[14][15]. This becomes the defining mark of Christian discipleship.

Farewell Discourse (14:1-16:33): Jesus provides extensive teaching about:

- **Love and Obedience:** "If you love me, keep my commandments" (14:15)[16][17] - demonstrating that true love for God is evidenced through obedience

Resurrection (20:1-31): Jesus' victory over death provides the foundation for Christian faith and hope, with Thomas's confession "My Lord and my God!" (20:28) serving as the climactic recognition of Jesus' divine identity[20].

IV. Epilogue: Restoration and Commission (John 21:1-25)

Peter's Restoration (21:15-17): The threefold question "Do you love me?" followed by "Feed my sheep" demonstrates that love for Jesus must be expressed through caring

for others and faithful ministry.

Speech and Behavior that Demonstrates Love for God

John's Gospel provides clear examples of how Christians can express their love for God through both words and actions.

Prayer and Worship

Worship in Spirit and Truth: Jesus taught the Samaritan woman that "true worshipers will worship the Father in the Spirit and in truth, for they are the kind of worshipers the Father seeks" (John 4:23-24)[21]. Authentic worship flows from a heart transformed by God's love.

Laying Down One's Life: "Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends" (15:13). Ultimate love may require the sacrifice of personal interests for the sake of others.

Essential Christian Doctrines from John's Gospel

Core Theological Truths
